Post Closes at 5 PM on Independence Day Have an enjoyable and safe Fourth





The Fourth of July (Independence Day) has been a federal holiday in the U.S. since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the American Revolution.

BACKGROUND: When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to the growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the pamphlet "Common Sense," published by *Thomas Paine* in early 1776.

On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate *Richard Henry Lee* introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on *Lee's* resolution, but appointed a five-man committee including *Thomas Jefferson* of Virginia, *John Adams* of Massachusetts, *Roger Sherman* of Connecticut, *Benjamin Franklin* of Pennsylvania and *Robert R. Livingston* of New York—to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of *Lee's* resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, *John Adams* wrote to his wife *Abigail* that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written mostly by *Jefferson*. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, *Adams* believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and turned down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. During the summer of 1776 some colonists celebrated the birth of independence by holding mock funerals for *King George III* as a way of symbolizing the end of the monarchy's hold on America and the triumph of liberty.

Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the ongoing war. *George Washington* issued double rations of rum to all his soldiers to mark the anniversary of independence in 1778, and 1781, several months before the key American victory at the Battle of Yorktown. Massachusetts became the first state to make July 4th an official state holiday. After the Revolutionary War, Americans continued to celebrate Independence Day. The tradition of setting off fireworks on the 4th began in Philadelphia on July 4, 1777, during the first organized celebration of Independence Day. Ship's cannon fired a 13-gun salute in honor of the 13 colonies. The *Pennsylvania Evening Post* reported: "at night there was a grand exhibition of fireworks on the Commons, and the city was beautifully illuminated." That same night, the Sons of Liberty set off fireworks over Boston Common. The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more wide-spread after the War of 1812, in which the US again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees.

National Buffalo Soldiers Day, 28 JULY, celebrates the contributions of some of the earliest Black troops in the US military. These troops served on the Western frontier after the Civil War. In 1866, Congress passed legislation known as the Army Organization Act, which formalized the creation of six all Black US Cavalry infantry units. The first troops to be called Buffalo Soldiers were assigned to the 10th Cavalry Regiment, Fort Leavenworth, KS. The nickname was given to them by Native American tribes who fought in the Indian Wars.

Veterans Can Now File an Appeal Online at the BVA Website: The Board of Veterans' Appeals (Board, BVA) recently updated and improved its website to make sure all the information you need is available and easy to understand. Also included is what the Board does and what to expect during an appeal. Veterans can NOW file their request of appeal to the Board online.

To request an appeal online: If you disagree with a decision VA made on your claim, you can log into VA.gov and electronically file VA Form 10182. The process is simple!

- Navigate your browser to https://www.va.gov/decision-reviews/board-appeal/
- Select "Request a Board Appeal" to go to the VA.gov login screen. You MUST have a VA.gov account.
- The appeal tool will walk you through the process of filing an appeal correctly online.

- You can select which type of appeal you wish: Direct Review, Evidence Submission, or Hearing. You can also find more information about all these options and what to expect during your appeal on the Board's homepage.

There are several ways to renew your American Legion membership:

- Online at www.mylegion.org. You can use a credit card online <u>and</u> set-up automatic yearly renewal with your credit card. You can also update your profile information: address and phone number. You need your permanent membership ID number to start an account at mylegion.org. If you have a hand written card, you probably have a temporary number. <u>Email me for your permanent number.</u>
- 2. By mail. If you've received your renewal request from National Headquarters, mail it to Post 10 at 9950 Cockrell Road, Manassas, VA 20110 attn: Post 10 Membership. If you haven't received a form from National Headquarters, send a check, and a note with your name, ID number, address, email and phone number.
- 3. In person. Stop by Post 10 and ask the bartender for a membership envelope, fill out the envelope, include your membership number and dues.
- 4. Legion dues are \$35.00 and your new 2022 membership card will be mailed to you. Please provide your address, email and phone number. It's important to be able to contact you. Your information is stored in a protected database, accessible to only the post officers with the need to know. If you have an email account, and can receive the newsletter electronically, it will save the Post money. Please feel free to email me.

VA announced the addition of nine rare respiratory cancers to the list of presumed service-connected disabilities due to exposure to fine particulate matter for Veterans who served any amount of time in Afghanistan, Djibouti, Syria or Uzbekistan during the Persian Gulf War, from September 19, 2001, to the present, or The Southwest Asia theater of operations from August 2, 1990, to the present. VA is taking a new approach to making decisions on presumptives, one that takes all available science into account, with one goal in mind – getting today's Veterans, and Vets in the decades ahead – the benefits they deserve, as fast as possible. VA identified, through a focused review of scientific and medical evidence, a biological plausibility between airborne hazards, specifically particulate matter, and carcinogensis of the respiratory tract; the unique circumstances of these rare cancers warrant a presumption of service connection. Veterans and survivors who had claims previously denied for any of the below respiratory cancers are encouraged to file a supplemental claim for benefits;

Squamous cell carcinoma of the larynx; Squamous cell carcinoma of the trachea; Adenocarcinoma of the trachea; Salivary gland-type tumors of the trachea; Adenosquamous carcinoma of the lung; Large cell carcinoma of the lung; Salivary gland-type tumors of the lung; Sarcomatoid carcinoma of the lung and; Typical and atypical carcinoid of the lung.

VA will contact impacted Veterans and survivors to inform them about their eligibility and it will provide information on how to apply. To apply for benefits, Veterans and survivors may visit <u>VA.gov</u> or call toll-free at 800-827-1000.

It is very important that you know that you must sign and complete a "Appointment of Veterans Service Organization as Claimant's Representative (also called "power of attorney" form). This

authorizes The American Legion to assist Veterans and beneficiaries. Additionally, please send your full and complete contact information.

HURRICANE SEASON is UPON US:

The 2021 hurricane season recorded 21 named storms and 7 hurricanes, including four considered "major" at category three and higher. Eight intense storms hit the U.S. coastline. Every year, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicts what to expect for the upcoming hurricane season, and the 2022 hurricane season is no different. Whether the prediction is for a mild or active, solidifying and testing preparation plans and staying informed is everyone's business, and "Being Prepared, Being Ready" is prudent. The time to be prepared and be ready is now. Planning to protect the people and things you love as we enter hurricane season is essential. Do not try to prepare for a hurricane or any emergency when it happens or as an afterthought. Do it now! Dangerous storms and hurricanes can lead to devastation, but there are ways you can prepare and mitigate damage to your home and remain safe during the storm. These actions will help you and your family prepare:

- Find out if you live in a hurricane evacuation zone.
- Locate the nearest shelter if you need to leave your home.
- Review/update insurance policies.
- Build or replenish your emergency kit with hurricane supplies.
- Plan to protect your home.
- Create, be familiar and test your family plan.

Evacuation Plan: Find out if you live in a hurricane zone. Add the evacuation routes and shelter areas to your plan. Load evacuation routes and nearest shelter directions to your phone maps. If you live in a hurricane area, now is the time to know your way to shelters/safe areas and add to your plan to see where you would go and how you would get there. You do not need to travel hundreds of miles, but you do need multiple options.

Your destination could be a friend or relative who doesn't live in an evacuation zone. If you live in a well-built home outside the evacuation zone, your safest place may be your home.

Stay alert, listen, and move following the direction of your local authorities.

Be sure to account for your pets in your plan.

Keep in mind that you may need to adjust any evacuation plans based on the latest health and safety guidelines. Stay informed!

Don't wait for emergencies/disasters to happen; build and test your preparedness plan and "go" kit. Stay informed and be prepared!

VA MOBILE CHECK-IN FOR APPOINTMENTS: Beginning this summer, some VA facilities will allow Veterans to do one or both of these: 1) Start the check-in process up to seven days in advance of the appointment. 2) Check in at the clinic using your smartphone on the day of your appointment. As part of how VA is modernizing the way Veterans receive care, VA received extensive feedback from Veterans and caregivers about how the checking-in process can be made better, especially for those who use assistive technologies to access their benefits online. Coming to all VA locations end of August. Five facts Veterans should know about VA's patient check-in application

1. Veterans will always have the option to check in for an appointment with a staff member. Using the new mobile app is not a requirement. VA staff are honored to check Veterans in for appointments and to answer questions.

2. Veterans will need to check-in at the facility with a staff member on appointment day if they require changes to demographic (contact, next of kin, emergency contact) or insurance information.

3. The patient application has two options: 1) Pre-check-in helps Veterans confirm demographic information is up to date prior to an appointment. 2) Mobile check-in allows Veterans to check-in for an appointment on a smartphone when they arrive at the facility. Upon arrival at a clinic offering mobile check-in, Veterans should locate the poster titled, "Have an appointment? Check in with your phone" prominently on display. They should then text or scan the QR code as directed in the poster to start the process. To use the mobile app, Veterans must have a smartphone that is connected to Wi-Fi or cellular service and the phone number on file with VA, as this is how VA verifies your identity. Veterans can update their contact information online.

4. The national contract for VetLink kiosks will expire at the end of September 2022. After that date, Veterans should: Use the patient check-in application for self-service check-in or check in with a staff member; Submit your travel reimbursement claims through the Beneficiary Travel Self-Service System (BTSSS), mail, fax and/or in-person at a VA medical center.

Protect your Medicare number, your other info, and your money:

Last year, the FTC got almost a million reports about impersonation scammers — fake government agents, pretend grandkids, bogus sweethearts, and others who took almost \$2.3 <u>billion</u> from people across the country. So far this year, impersonation scams are still the most-reported fraud. Scammers keep changing their stories to catch you off-guard. Some scams even ask you for your Medicare number. If anyone surprises you with a call, email, text, or message on social media and asks for money or personal information — no matter what story they tell — it's most likely a scam.

Medicare Fraud Prevention:

Reduce unwanted calls and email: Use call blocking technology or devices that stop unwanted calls — like scams calls and illegal robocalls — before they reach you. Use email spam filters to reduce phishing scam attempts, and set your computer software to update automatically.

Keep information private: Medicare won't call or text to ask you for money. Even if your Caller ID says its Medicare, it could be faked. Don't share personal or financial information with anyone who calls, emails, or texts saying they are from a government agency. Don't click links or open attachments in email and text messages, even if they seem to come from Medicare or a company you know. They could be messages phishing for your account numbers, passwords, or other information.

Protect your money: Refuse to pay anyone who demands payment by wire transfer, gift card, or cryptocurrency. Only scammers tell you to pay these ways. It's hard to track those payments, and almost impossible to get your money back. If you suspect a scam, tell the FTC: ReportFraud.ftc.gov.
