



ANNUAL NORTHERN VIRGINIA VETERANS PARADE








Come on out and watch the numerous participants and military vehicles.

If you've been on social media or checked your email inbox recently, you've no doubt received countless solicitations from law firms or agencies advertising their assistance with your VA claim in the wake of the PACT Act and the Camp Lejeune lawsuit. Here are some important things to remember:

- File a claim for any PACT Act conditions.
- Contact an Accredited Service Officer today to discuss the PACT Act and what it means for you.
- Hold off on committing to a Camp Lejeune lawsuit until VA publishes how the offset will affect your settlement and benefits.
- **NEVER PAY for claims assistance**. Presumptive claims are straightforward and can easily be handled by any VA-accredited claims representative.
- If you've been fighting for years, you may think a PACT Act claim will be complicated. Good news: Presumptive claims are some of the simplest claims because VA is conceding that your illness happened because you went somewhere bad.

Happy 247th Birthday U.S. MARINE CORPS

On November 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia passed a resolution stating that "two Battalions of Marines be raised" for service as landing forces with the fleet. This resolution established the Continental Marines and marked the birthdate of the United

States Marine Corps. Serving on land and at sea, these first Marines distinguished themselves in a number of important operations. Following the Revolutionary War Marines saw action in the quasi-war with France, landed in Santo Domingo, and took part in many operations against the Barbary pirates along the *"Shores of Tripoli"*.

Following the War of 1812 the Marines protected American interests around the world and at home. During the Mexican War (1846-1848), a battalion of Marines joined General Scott's army at Pueblo and fought all the way to the "Halls of Montezuma," Mexico City. Marines also served ashore and afloat in the Civil War (1861-1865), a battalion fought at Bull Run. Following the Spanish-American War (1898), in which Marines performed with valor in Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippines, the Corps entered an era of expansion and professional development. Marines saw active service in the Philippine Insurrection (1899-1902), the Boxer Rebellion in China (1900) and in numerous other places.

In WWI the Marine Corps distinguished itself on the battlefields of France as the 4th Marine Brigade earned the title of "Devil Dogs" ("Teufelshunde") for heroic action during 1918 at Belleau Wood, Soissons, St. Michiel, Blanc Mont, and in the final Meuse-Argonne offensive. Marine aviation dates from 1912 played a part in the war effort. During the 20 years before WWII, the Corps began to develop the doctrine needed for amphibious warfare. The success of this effort was proven first on Guadalcanal, then on Bougainville, Tarawa, New Britain, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Saipan, Guam, Tinian, Peleliu, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. The war cost the Marines nearly 87,000 dead and wounded, and 82 Marines were awarded the Medal of Honor.

Landing at Inchon, Korea. September 1950, Marines proved that the doctrine of amphibious assault was still viable and necessary. More than 25,000 Marines were killed or wounded during the Korean War.

The landing of the 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade at Da Nang in 1965 marked the beginning of large-scale Marine involvement in Vietnam. The Vietnam War exacted a high cost as well with over 13,000 Marines killed and more than 88,000 wounded. In the spring of 1975, Marines evacuated embassy staffs, American citizens, and refugees in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, and Saigon, Republic of Vietnam. In May, Marines played an integral role in the rescue of the crew of the SS *Mayaguez* captured off the coast of Cambodia.

The Corps played a key role in the development of the Rapid Deployment Force, a multi-service organization created to insure a flexible, timely military response around the world when needed. The 1980s brought an increasing number of terrorist attacks on U.S. embassies around the world. August 1982, Marines landed at Beirut, Lebanon, as part of the multi-national peace-keeping force. On 23 Oct 1983, the Marine barracks in Beirut was bombed, causing the highest peacetime losses to the Corps in its history. August 1990, the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait saw the largest movement of Marine Corps forces since WWII. Marines deployed to the Persian Gulf, Operation Desert Shield. Operation Desert Storm was launched 16 Jan 1991. On 24 Feb the 1st and 2d MARDIV breached the Iraqi defense lines and stormed into occupied Kuwait. Soon after the September 2001 terrorist attacks on US soil Marine units deployed to the Arabian Sea and set up a forward operating base in southern Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom. The Marine Corps continued to play a key role in the Global War on Terrorism. The I Marine Expeditionary Force, including Task Force Tarawa and the UK's 1st Armored Division, were the first conventional ground units to enter Iraq in late March as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Today's Marine Corps stands ready to continue in their proud tradition combining a long and proud heritage of faithful service to the nation, with the resolve to face tomorrow's challenges will continue to keep the Marine Corps the "best of the best."

Legionnaire Membership Report

Information to all members: The renewal notices being sent out by National DO NOT state how long you have been a member but only your LAST PAID YEAR. I know this may be confusing as it states 'MEMBER SINCE 2022' but you have not lost any time on your membership.

We are currently at 61.6% of membership for 2023. Great Job! If you renew before Veterans Day, November 11th, you will be eligible for the Early Bird prize. This year we will be giving away the American Legion Portfolio.

Remember to renew on-line you will need to have or create an account on <u>MyLegion.org</u>. Online renewals can also print out a new membership card on-line. This will show that you are paid up and I will also send out a new 2023 card once I am notified by National of your renewal.

There are several ways to renew your American Legion membership:

- 1. Online at www.mylegion.org. You can use a credit card online <u>and</u> set-up automatic yearly renewal with your credit card. You can also update your profile information: address and phone number. You need your permanent membership ID number to start an account at mylegion.org. If you have a hand written card, you probably have a temporary number. <u>Email me for your permanent number.</u>
- 2. By mail. If you've received your renewal request from National Headquarters, mail it to Post 10 at 9950 Cockrell Road, Manassas, VA 20110 attn: Post 10 Membership. If you haven't received a form from National Headquarters, send a check, and a note with your name, ID number, address, email and phone number.
- 3. In person. Stop by Post 10 and ask the bartender for a membership envelope, fill out the envelope, include your membership number and dues.
- 4. Legion dues are \$35.00 and your new 2023 membership card will be mailed to you. Please provide your address, email and phone number. It's important to be able to contact you. Your information is stored in a protected database, accessible to only the post officers with the need to know. If you have an email account, and can receive the newsletter electronically, it will save the Post money.

What does it mean to be 100% disabled by the VA? To be 100% disabled by VA standards means that you are totally disabled. Veterans awarded disability at this level receive the maximum in schedular monthly compensation. VA has stringent criteria Veterans must meet in order to receive this rating.



It is very important that you know that you must sign and complete a "Appointment of Veterans Service Organization as Claimant's Representative (also called "power of attorney" form). This authorizes The American Legion to assist Veterans and beneficiaries. Additionally, please send your full and complete contact information.

Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day.

A lot of Americans get this confused. Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive — although it's largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

Originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I. WWI officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting

ended about seven months before that when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the **eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.** For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and dubbed Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress officially recognized it as the end of the war, and in 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor Veterans of World War I.

Then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of Veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word "Armistice" to "Veterans" so the day would honor American Veterans of all wars.

Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill in 1968 to ensure that a few federal holidays — Veterans Day included — would be celebrated on a Monday. Officials hoped it would spur travel and other family activities over a long weekend, which would stimulate the economy. The bill set Veterans Day commemorations for the fourth Monday of every October. On Oct. 25, 1971, the first Veterans Day under this new bill was held. There was a lot of confusion about the change, and many states were unhappy, choosing to continue to recognize the day as they previously had — in November. Within a few years, it became apparent that most U.S. citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on Nov. 11, since it was a matter of historic and patriotic significance. On Sept. 20, 1975, President *Gerald Ford* signed another law (Public Law 94-97), which returned the annual observance to its original date starting in 1978.

Greetings from Martinsville, Virginia to my fellow Legionnaires of Post 10!

While I departed Northern Virginia almost ten months ago, I've still been in contact with Post 10 (and still a Post 10 member). I made the 4.5-hour trip to Manassas twice since my departure to play golf in the Sons of The American Legion (SAL), Squadron 10, April Jimmy Bryant Memorial and the September John Chada Memorial golf tournaments.

Some Post 10 Legionnaires may be unaware that Squadron 10 are an incredible fundraising group for Veteran causes within Post 10. The Sons along with Auxiliary Unit 10 are the biggest charitable fund raisers within Post 10. Both the Sons and Auxiliary provide tremendous support to Veterans and Veteran causes.

I know that the Sons contribute the funds they raise to several Veteran related organizations like Fisher House and others. The other way that the Sons contribute to the Manassas/Prince William County Veteran community is through their yearly Christmas gift distribution.

This is an amazing program where members of the Sons solicit requests from Veterans in local rehab and retirement facilities. In December they fill dozens of gift bags with the requested items for distribution to these very deserving Veterans.

Several years ago, while speaking with a long-time member of the Sons, he told me that as fulfilling as this program was, he said that it was disappointing that the Veteran recipients often said that they would like a fellow Veteran to talk to and as a Son, they could not relate. So, I became involved with the Sons Christmas gift distribution about six years ago bringing the gift bags to these deserving Veterans along with a member of the Sons.

Many of the Veterans in these facilities have no family members to visit them and these brief visits are often sometimes all they get. It's incredible to bring them some holiday cheer and to visit with them. I've met some incredible WW II, Korean and Vietnam veterans during the Sons gift distribution. Their stories will stay with me forever.






