- 1. Online at www.mylegion.org. You can use a credit card online and set-up automatic yearly renewal with your credit card. You can also update your profile information: address and phone number. You need your permanent membership ID number to start an account at mylegion.org. If you have a hand written card, you probably have a temporary number. Email me for your permanent number. Online renewals can also print out a new membership card on-line. This will show that you are paid up and I will also send out a new 2024 card once I am notified by National of your renewal.
- 2. By mail. If you've received your renewal request from National Headquarters, mail it to Post 10 at 9950 Cockrell Road, Manassas, VA 20110 attn: Post 10 Membership. If you haven't received a form from National Headquarters, send a check, and a note with your name, ID number, address, email and phone number.
- 3. In person. Stop by Post 10 and ask the bartender for a membership envelope, fill out the envelope, include your membership number and dues.

Current Legion dues for 2024 are \$35.00. REMEMBER the 2025 membership year the dues will be \$50.00. (Read notice on front page of this newsletter). Please provide your address, email and phone number. It's important to be able to contact you. Your information is stored in a protected database, accessible to only the post officers with the need to know. The POPPY and MEMORIAL DAY

In the war-torn battlefields of Europe, the common red field poppy was one of the first plants to reappear. Its seeds scattered in the wind and sat dormant in the ground, only germinating when the ground was disturbed—as it was by the very brutal fighting of World War 1.

John McCrae, a Canadian soldier and physician, witnessed the war first hand and was inspired to write the now-famous poem "In Flanders Fields" in 1915. He saw the poppies scattered throughout the battlefield surrounding his artillery position in Belgium.

In November 1918, days before the official end of the war, an American professor named *Moina Michael* wrote her own poem, "We Shall Keep the Faith," which was inspired by *McCrae's* "In Flanders Fields." In her poem she mentioned wearing the "poppy red" to honor the dead, and with that, the tradition of adorning one's clothing with a single red poppy in remembrance of those killed in the Great War. *Moina* became known as "The Poppy Lady."

The wearing of the poppy was traditionally done on Memorial Day in the U.S., but the symbolism has evolved to encompass all Veterans living and deceased, so poppies may be worn on Veterans Day as well. Not long after the custom began, it was adopted by other Allied nations, including Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom. In these countries, the poppy is worn on Remembrance Day (Nov. 11th).

Today, poppies are not only a symbol of loss of life, but also of recovery and new life, especially in support of the Veterans who survived the war but suffered from physical and psychological injuries long after it ended.

"In Flanders Fields"

by John McCrae, May 1915

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies
grow
In Flanders fields.





"We Shall Keep the Faith"

by Moina Michael, November 1918

Oh! you who sleep in Flanders Fields, Sleep sweet – to rise anew! We caught the torch you threw And holding high, we keep the Faith With All who died.

We cherish, too, the poppy red
That grows on fields where valor led;
It seems to signal to the skies
That blood of heroes never dies,
But lends a lustre to the red
Of the flower that blooms above the dead
In Flanders Fields.

And now the Torch and Poppy Red We wear in honor of our dead. Fear not that ye have died for naught; We'll teach the lesson that ye wrought In Flanders Fields.

MEMORIAL DAY, Monday, 27 MAY 2024

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN MEMORIAL DAY AND VETERANS DAY?

On both Memorial Day and Veterans Day, it's customary to spend time remembering and honoring the countless veterans who have served the United States throughout the country's history. However, there is a distinction between the two holidays:

Memorial Day commemorates the men and women who **died** while in the military service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. In other words, the purpose of Memorial Day is to memorialize the veterans who made the **ultimate sacrifice** for their country. We spend time remembering those who lost their lives and could not come home, reflecting on their service and why we have the luxury and freedom that we enjoy today. We might consider how we can support and safeguard their grieving families and loved ones who are left behind.

Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor ALL who served—in wartime or peacetime—regardless of whether they died or survived. Veterans Day is always observed officially on November 11, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls.

For those who have lost loved ones in the military, hearing "**Happy Memorial Day**" can be unsettling. Many veterans have expressed their displeasure with the phrase, deeming it inappropriate for the occasion. While Veterans Day is a time to honor all those who have served in the military, Memorial Day is meant to pay tribute to those military personnel who *died while serving*.

The holiday began three years after the Civil War ended and was known as Decoration Day, a time to decorate the graves of fallen soldiers with flowers. The designated date was 30 May, the Uniform Monday Holiday Act (28 JUN 1968) took effect, moving Memorial Day to the last Monday in May.

In 2015, Marine Corps veteran *Jennie Haskamp* wrote a piece for <u>The Washington Post</u> in which she shared her frustration with the sentiment of "Happy Memorial Day" and the holiday's transformation into "grilled meat, super-duper discounts, a day off work, beer, potato salad and porches draped in bunting." She said it should be more than that. Others have argued that using Memorial Day as an opportunity to celebrate with loved ones and embrace the joy that life has to offer is a fitting way to honor those who died in service of our country.

Those who seek to remind people of the more somber meaning of Memorial Day have advocated for Congress to change the date of the holiday back to 30 May, instead of making it part of a three-day weekend of leisure. These efforts have not been successful, Congress established "The National Moment of Remembrance" in 2000, asking Americans to pause for a minute of silence and reflection in honor of those who died in military service at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day.

In *Haskamp's* Washington Post piece, she noted that a friend reminded her how many people use Memorial Day to "pause and remember the men and women who paid the price of our freedom, and then go on about enjoying those freedoms." But she believes not enough people commemorate the occasion in this way. "Not enough people pause. Not enough people remember," she wrote, "I hope you enjoy your weekend — but I hope you pause to remember, too."



Every eligible Veteran should enroll in VA health care for one simple reason: Veterans who come to the VA are proven to have better health outcomes and pay less than Veterans who don't enroll. Even if Veterans don't need this care today, you might need it tomorrow, or the next day, or 30 years from now. It's quick and easy to apply, and once you're in, you have access for life.

It is very important that you know that you must sign and complete a "Appointment of Veterans" Service Organization as Claimant's Representative (also called "power of attorney" form). This authorizes The American Legion to assist Veterans and beneficiaries. Additionally, please send

your full and complete contact information. You cannot have more than one POA!

I am available to assist Veterans and their families in completing and filing benefit claims. Contact *Ginger Harvey* at: ginger.c.harvey@gmail.com for VA claims assistance. Please include all of your contact information so that I can better assist you. Post 10 Service Officer, Ginger Harvey

REMINDER: During ceremonies the Social Quarters is CLOSED. Post SQ Rules clearly states "During Post 10 ceremonies the Social Quarters will be closed. Occupants must either attend the Post 10 ceremony or *vacate Post 10 property*." Take the time and attend the ceremony, you may find it informative, educational, and interesting.

Memorial Day is a day of remembrance to honor the brave men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice in service to their country. It is a time to reflect on the sacrifices of our fallen heroes and to pay tribute to their legacy of courage, dedication, and selflessness. That is why VA's National Cemetery Administration is partnering with Carry The Load this year. Together, the goal is to honor and remember Veterans interred in VA National Cemeteries. Carry The Load, an organization dedicated to remembering the fallen, will visit 34 VA National Cemeteries traveling 20,000 miles along five separate routes covering all continental 48 states in what is known as the National Relay for Memorial May 2024. Along the routes, many marchers will carry signs, banners and flags honoring a fallen service member, Veteran or first responder. Find out when & where the National Relay will be in a city near you as supporters and volunteers walk through 48 states & hundreds of communities to honor our nation's heroes. The list of national cemeteries, along with the dates and times that they will be visited can be found at Memorial May 2024 – National Cemetery Administration (va.gov). Those wishing to participate in a march are asked to register in advance. No donation is required to participate.

You may have heard in the news about the recent Change Healthcare (CHC) <u>cybersecurity incident</u>, which impacted many health care institutions across America. We at VA want to provide an update on what this incident could mean for you. CHC is one of VA's vendors, and as soon we became aware of the breach we took swift action to disconnect from all known systems with CHC; we have confirmed that there is no malicious activity or irregularities in our system. However, CHC announced that "a substantial portion of the people in America" could have had some protected health information leaked as a result of this incident. While there is no confirmation that Veteran data was leaked as a result of this incident, we want to provide you with all of the information that you could need to protect yourself.

Here's what you need to know: CHC is offering credit monitoring for all impacted individuals. CHC will provide two years of free credit monitoring and identity theft protections for those impacted. You can call 1-866-262-5342 or visit the dedicated UHG/CHC website at http://changecybersupport.com to learn more.

VA has general fraud protection information available to you. There are always steps that you can take to protect yourself against fraud and identity theft, and VA has resources available to you. General information on how to protect yourself from fraud is available at Protecting Veterans From Fraud | Veterans Affairs (va.gov). This includes a fraud protection toolkit, frequently asked questions, information about how to be vigilant about scams, and much more.

The federal trade commission also offers resources to help protect your identity. For additional information about other precautions available to you, visit the Federal Trade Commission website at http://www.consumer.ftc.gov/features/feature-0014-identity-theft.

VA health care operations are not impacted. While we work through this issue, we want you to know that VA remains fully open for business—and there is no known adverse impact on VA patient care or outcomes to date. Please do not hesitate to come to us for all of your health care needs, as usual. At this time, we cannot confirm that any Veteran data has been compromised, so we cannot answer specific questions as to whether your data is involved. But if it is determined that Veteran data was included in the data breach, we will ensure that you are notified, and full support is provided. Protecting your personal health information is—and always will be—one of our top priorities. We will continue to monitor this incident closely and provide updates whenever possible.


