1. Online at www.mylegion.org. You can use a credit card online and set-up automatic yearly renewal with your credit card. You can also update your profile information: address and phone number. You need your permanent membership ID number to start an account at mylegion.org. If you have a hand written card, you probably have a temporary number. Email me for your permanent number. Online renewals can also print out a new membership card on-line. This will show that you are paid up and I will also send out a new 2024 card once I am notified by National of your renewal.
2. By mail. If you've received your renewal request from National Headquarters, mail it to Post 10 at 9950 Cockrell Road, Manassas, VA 20110 attn: Post 10 Membership. If you haven't received a form from National Headquarters, send a check, and a note with your name, ID number, address, email and phone number.
3. In person. Stop by Post 10 and ask the bartender for a membership envelope, fill out the envelope, include your membership number and dues.

Current Legion dues for 2024 are \$35.00. **REMEMBER** the 2025 membership year the dues will be \$50.00. Please provide your address, email and phone number. It's important to be able to contact you. Your information is stored in a protected database, accessible to only the post officers with the need to know. If you have an email account, and can receive the newsletter electronically, it will save the Post money. Please feel free to email me with any questions/concerns about your membership.

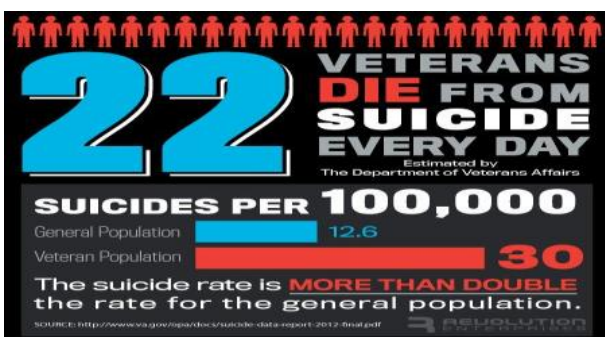

To ensure a civil conversation: Show respect for the views expressed by others, even if you strongly disagree.

Why it's not rude to ignore "hi, how are you?" text messages from strangers: A text message from an unknown number that simply says: hi, how are you? seems harmless. Your first instinct might be to respond to see if it's someone you know. Or maybe tell them they made a mistake. But it's best to ignore these type of text messages. Scammers are using this tactic as a conversation starter, so don't text back. If you do, here's what happens next. The person (a scammer) on the other end of the text will probably apologize...and find a way to keep the conversation going to befriend you. Then, once they have your trust, they'll try to offer you advice on investing in cryptocurrency or claim they can teach you the secrets to making big money in the crypto markets. For a fee, of course. But it's all a scam and they'll just steal your money. Even if you just reply to the text but don't engage in conversation, you've still confirmed they reached a working telephone number. Which could lead to more calls and texts from scammers.

What's the best way to avoid scams if you're getting messages from numbers you don't recognize?

Don't reply to text messages from unknown numbers. It could lead to a scam. Delete and report them using your phone's "report junk" option or forwarding unwanted texts to 7726 (SPAM) and unwanted emails to your email provider.

Never click links in an unexpected message. Some links might steal your information, or install malware that gives scammers access to your device.

Don't trust anyone who says you can quickly and easily make money. Every investment has risks. Only scammers guarantee you'll make lots of money in a short time with zero risk.

Common Types of Gaming Fraud That Affect Veterans: According to the Consumer Finance Protection Bureau (CFPB), American consumers spent nearly \$57 billion on gaming in 2023, which includes hardware, software and in-game transactions, which have the potential to convert dollars to virtual currencies or other gaming assets. This creates opportunities for consumers, including Veterans, to experience possible fraudulent activities and scams.

The most common types of gaming fraud that affect Veterans

- Credit card fraud: Credit card details are stolen and used illegally.
- Account hacking and takeovers: Hackers gain access to financial information, personal details and contact lists.
- Affiliate fraud: Gamers paying out rewards to non-existent players.

Data Collection Concerns in Online Gaming: Online gaming markets are also a hotbed for data collection. Occasionally, players actively choose to provide their personal data to set up an account, such as name, birth date, location and payment information. Players may not be aware that “the data collected by video games can be mined for patterns and statistical relationships to infer additional personal information” (Kröger, et al., 2023). This can appear as targeted ads that highlight products specific to player interests. Other times, this information is used by predatory actors in ways that players don’t anticipate or realize they are authorizing.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and CFPB reported that, in most cases, gaming companies provide minimal support when users experience financial harm or risks. These risks include hacking attempts, account theft, scams, unauthorized transactions, and the loss of in-game assets. Gaming companies often put the onus of fraud prevention on the individual players, initially warning them to beware of scams and phishing attempts but doing little to assist when fraud does occur.

What you can do: Although players are not able to prevent all fraudulent behavior and data privacy issues on their own, there are some steps that can be taken to protect yourself:

- Sign up for Multifactor Authentication (MFA) to prevent account takeovers or theft.
- Confirm the validity of any sites that you are making any gaming, hardware, software or mobile app purchases on. Check company and product reviews, national databases, and assess URL/browsing information to ensure the purchase is legitimate.
- Read the fine print of how your personal data is being used and shared by the gaming platform.

Contact CFPB or FTC if you are a victim of fraudulent activities.

The Fourth of July (Independence Day) has been a federal holiday in the U.S. since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the American Revolution.

BACKGROUND: When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to the growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the pamphlet “Common Sense,” published by *Thomas Paine* in early 1776.

On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate *Richard Henry Lee* introduced a motion calling for the colonies’ independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on *Lee’s* resolution, but appointed a five-man committee—including *Thomas Jefferson* of Virginia, *John Adams* of Massachusetts, *Roger Sherman* of Connecticut, *Benjamin Franklin* of Pennsylvania and *Robert R. Livingston* of New York—to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of *Lee’s* resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, *John Adams* wrote to his wife *Abigail* that July 2 “will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival” and that the celebration should include “Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other.”

On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written mostly by *Jefferson*. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, *Adams* believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and turned down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. During the summer of 1776 some colonists celebrated the birth of independence by holding mock funerals for *King George III* as a way of symbolizing the end of the monarchy’s hold on America and the triumph of liberty.

Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the ongoing war. *George Washington* issued double rations of rum to all his soldiers to mark the anniversary of independence in 1778, and 1781, several months before the key American victory at the Battle of Yorktown. Massachusetts became the first state to make July 4th an official state holiday. After the Revolutionary War, Americans continued to celebrate Independence Day. The tradition of setting off fireworks on the 4th began in Philadelphia on July 4, 1777, during the first organized celebration of Independence Day. Ship’s cannon fired a 13-gun salute in honor of the 13 colonies. The *Pennsylvania Evening Post* reported: “at night there was a grand exhibition of fireworks on the Commons, and the city was beautifully illuminated.” That same night, the Sons of Liberty set off fireworks over Boston Common. The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the US again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees.

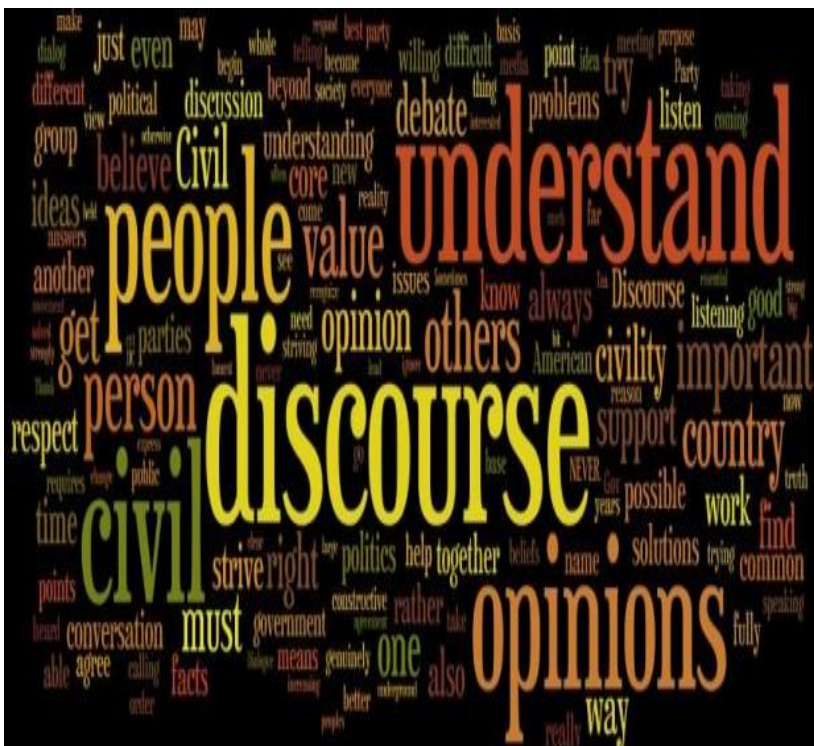

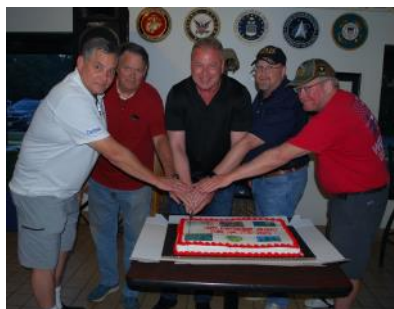
