


There are several ways to renew your American Legion membership:

- 1. Online at www.mylegion.org. You can use a credit card online and set-up automatic yearly renewal with your credit card. You can also update your profile information: address and phone number. You need your permanent membership ID number to start an account at mylegion.org. If you have a hand written card, you probably have a temporary number. Email me for your permanent number. Online renewals can also print out a new membership card on-line. This will show that you are paid up and I will also send out a new 2024 card once I am notified by National of your renewal.
- 2. By mail. If you've received your renewal request from National Headquarters, mail it to Post 10 at 9950 Cockrell Road, Manassas, VA 20110 attn: Post 10 Membership. If you haven't received a form from National Headquarters, send a check, and a note with your name, ID number, address, email and phone number.
- 3. In person. Stop by Post 10 and ask the bartender for a membership envelope, **fill out the envelope**, include your membership number and dues. Current Legion dues are \$50.00. Provide your address, email, and phone number. It's important to be able to contact you. Your information is stored in a protected database, accessible only to Post officers with a need to know. If you have an email address and can receive the newsletter electronically it will save the Post money. Please feel free to email me with any questions/concerns about your membership.

Happy 249th Birthday U.S. MARINE CORPS

On November 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia passed a resolution stating that "two Battalions of Marines be raised" for service as landing forces with the fleet. This resolution established the Continental Marines and marked the birthdate of the United States

Marine Corps. Serving on land and at sea, these first Marines distinguished themselves in a number of important operations. Following the Revolutionary War Marines saw action in the quasi-war with France, landed in Santo Domingo, and took part in many operations against the Barbary pirates along the *"Shores of Tripoli"*.

Following the War of 1812 the Marines protected American interests around the world and at home. During the Mexican War (1846-1848), a battalion of Marines joined General Scott's army at Pueblo and fought all the way to the "Halls of Montezuma," Mexico City. Marines also served ashore and afloat in the Civil War (1861-1865), a battalion fought at Bull Run. Following the Spanish-American War (1898), in which Marines performed with valor in Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippines, the Corps entered an era of expansion and professional development. Marines saw active service in the Philippine Insurrection (1899-1902), the Boxer Rebellion in China (1900) and in numerous other places. In WWI the Marine Corps distinguished itself on the battlefields of France as the 4th Marine Brigade earned the title of "Devil Dogs" ("Teufelshunde") for heroic action during 1918 at Belleau Wood, Soissons, St. Michiel, Blanc Mont, and in the final Meuse-Argonne offensive. Marine aviation dates from 1912 played a part in the war effort. During the 20 years before WWII, the Corps began to develop the doctrine needed for amphibious warfare. The success of this effort was proven first on Guadalcanal, then on Bougainville, Tarawa, New Britain, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Saipan, Guam, Tinian, Peleliu, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. The war cost the Marines nearly 87,000 dead and wounded, and 82 Marines were awarded the Medal of Honor.

Landing at Inchon, Korea. September 1950, Marines proved that the doctrine of amphibious assault was still viable and necessary. More than 25,000 Marines were killed or wounded during the Korean War.

The landing of the 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade at Da Nang in 1965 marked the beginning of large-scale Marine involvement in Vietnam. The Vietnam War exacted a high cost as well with over 13,000 Marines killed and more than 88,000 wounded. In the spring of 1975, Marines evacuated embassy staffs, American citizens, and refugees in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, and Saigon, Republic of Vietnam. In May, Marines played an integral role in the rescue of the crew of the SS *Mayaguez* captured off the coast of Cambodia.

The Corps played a key role in the development of the Rapid Deployment Force, a multi-service organization created to insure a flexible, timely military response around the world when needed. The 1980s brought an increasing number of terrorist attacks on U.S. embassies around the world. August 1982, Marines landed at Beirut, Lebanon, as part of the multi-national peace-keeping force. On 23 Oct 1983, the Marine barracks in Beirut was bombed, causing the highest peacetime losses to the Corps in its history. August 1990, the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait saw the largest movement of Marine Corps forces since WWII. Marines deployed to the Persian Gulf, Operation Desert Shield. Operation Desert Storm was launched 16 Jan 1991. On 24 Feb the 1st and 2d MARDIV breached the Iraqi defense lines and stormed into occupied Kuwait. Soon after the September 2001 terrorist attacks on US soil Marine units deployed to the Arabian Sea and set up a forward operating base in southern Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom. The Marine Corps continued to play a key role in the Global War on Terrorism. The I Marine Expeditionary Force, including Task Force Tarawa and the UK's 1st Armored Division, were the first conventional ground units to enter Iraq in late March as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Today's Marine Corps stands ready to continue in their proud tradition combining a long and proud heritage of faithful service to the nation, with the resolve to face tomorrow's challenges will continue to keep the Marine Corps the "best of the best."





Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day.

A lot of Americans get this confused. Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace, dead or alive, although it's largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

Originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I. WWI officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting ended about seven months before that when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and dubbed Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress officially recognized it as the end of the war, and in 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor Veterans of World War I. Then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of Veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word "Armistice" to "Veterans" so the day would honor American Veterans of all wars. Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill in 1968 to ensure that a few federal holidays, Veterans Day included, would be celebrated on a Monday. Officials hoped it would spur travel and other family activities over a long weekend, which would stimulate the economy. The bill set Veterans Day commemorations for the fourth Monday of every October. On Oct. 25, 1971, the first Veterans Day under this new bill was held. There was a lot of confusion about the change, and many states were unhappy, choosing to continue to recognize the day as they previously had in November. Within a few years, it became apparent that most US citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on Nov 11th, since it was a matter of historic and patriotic significance. On Sept. 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed another law (Public Law 94-97), which returned the annual observance to its original date starting in 1978. Submitted by Gunny

How to Avoid TSA PreCheck Scams: No one likes waiting in airport security lines. To speed things up, some people opt to get TSA PreCheck. Scammers know this and send emails that look like they're from TSA PreCheck—but they're not. The emails want you to click a link that takes you to a scam website that only looks like the official site—but it's not. If you pay to "enroll" or "renew" your TSA PreCheck, you may not even realize you've paid a scammer until you get to the airport for your next trip. But there are ways to spot these scams.

If you're applying for TSA PreCheck for the first time, you don't pay the application fee online. To get PreCheck, you complete the application and pay in person at a <u>TSA enrollment center</u>. Again: you don't pay online. Only a scammer will ask you to pay online to enroll.

If you already have TSA PreCheck, you can renew and pay in person or take care of both online. The real TSA even sends renewal reminder emails out. But to avoid a scam, start your renewal at tsa.gov/precheck instead of clicking a link. A scammer's link will take you to a scam site that looks real, but if you pay and give your information, the scammer will steal it.

To avoid scammers impersonating TSA PreCheck: **Don't click links in unexpected emails or text messages**, no matter how real they look. **Don't be rushed.** If someone insists that you to pay right away, chances are that's a scammer.

Start at tsa.gov/precheck. Typing in that URL yourself is the best way to avoid the scam. And remember that all TSA PreCheck sites are .gov sites, not a .com.

Tell the FTC at <u>ReportFraud.ftc.gov</u> if you think you spotted this scam. And learn **how to recognize phishing** scams to keep scammers from stealing your money or identity.
